This family friendly event gives you and your relatives the opportunity to get outdoors and work off those extra calories.

This year's hike will take place on the 4-mile Arrowhead Trail at Coyote Valley Open Space Preserve. The trail will lead you to a ridgetop with stunning views of Mount Hamilton, Mount Umunhum and the entire Coyote Valley. Observe the hills studded with rare serpentine rock outcroppings and keep your eyes out for sly coyotes or soaring raptors. The Arrowhead Trail was also recently certified as an interpretive site of the Juan Bautista de Anza trail, so hikers will be able learn about the expedition led through the Coyote Valley. A shorter 2-mile hike will also be available for families to participate in.
