9. Project Abstract

(Brief, 3-4 sentences)

Initially launched in response to COVID-19, Veggielution's Eastside Connect program serves more than 250 people per week through farm boxes, hot meals, and our onsite farm stand. Beginning in 2021, Veggielution will grow the capacity of Eastside Connect based on recommendations from our recent land use plan. By adding bike delivery, food safety certification, and value added products prepared by local residents, we will help build a more pandemic- and climate-resilient local food system.

Project Planning (20 points)

10. Describe the proposed project.

In March 2020, Veggielution launched Eastside Connect, a program through which we distribute fresh produce to low-income East San José residents who are experiencing the brunt of the COVID-19-related shutdowns. Each week we deliver 40 free farm boxes and 300 hot meals in addition to our onsite farm stand produce sales. Leading this effort with us are the low-income East San José food entrepreneurs who have completed our 6-month small business skills, food safety, and advocacy training program (Eastside Grown.) While Eastside Connect was initially launched as a direct response to the COVID-19 pandemic, it has quickly become a central strategy for us to connect people from diverse backgrounds through food and farming. Beginning in 2021, we will grow our Eastside Grown program in alignment with recommendations that emerged from our 2018-2020 land use planning project. Specifically, we will demonstrate more innovative and climate-resilient methods of growing, processing, and distributing Veggielution produce. And we will explore ways that our urban farm operation can be a platform to further increase economic mobility of low-income East San José residents.

In partnership with Silicon Valley Bicycle Coalition (SVBC), we will organize and train volunteers to deliver farm boxes. Switching to bike delivery will reduce and, ultimately, eliminate carbon emissions from the use of our farm truck. It will also be an opportunity to engage with a new audience and encourage them to learn more about Veggielution, Emma Prusch Farm Park, and the surrounding neighborhoods of East San José.

We will also complete Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) certification, including the creation of a food safety plan and upgrades to our packing line equipment to meet GAP best practices. This process will be a valuable learning experience not only for our team, but for our volunteers and interns who will be integral to helping us implement and sustain daily processes and record-keeping.

Finally, we will explore opportunities for graduates of our Eastside Grown food sovereignty program to create value-added products from farm produce in local community center commercial kitchens. By leveraging existing distribution channels such as the farm boxes, onsite farm stand, and (eventually) community events, there is an opportunity for low-income East San José residents to lead a new urban agriculture-based enterprise.

Eastside Connect builds the capacity of Veggielution to shape our local food system, invest in Emma Prusch Farm Park, and center the voices of historically marginalized communities. It aligns with efforts at the City, County, State, and Federal level to address equity and access in our local food system, including the referral recently approved by the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors to create a comprehensive, system-wide Food, Agriculture, and Health Access Initiative.

The projected lifetime of the Eastside Connect program is three years, in alignment with our current 2020-

2022 strategic plan. If it proves to be as successful beyond that time period as we hope, we will seek funding to operate and maintain it further into the future. Understanding the importance of long-term sustainability, Veggielution's staff and board are constantly developing and implementing ways to diversify our funding. Veggielution has a successful track record over the past nearly ten years of raising funds for staff, program, administrative, and special event costs. We are confident we will be able to ensure the continuity of this program through a combination of several strategies:

We will seek to expand our participation in (and funding from) the USDA Farm Fresh Food Relief Program, which pays farmers for delivery farm boxes to low-wage workers and their families

We will build and sustain strong relationships with local foundations

We will develop stronger ties to local corporations as well as to small business

We will expand our individual donor cultivation strategies

We will maintain a diverse and balanced funding structure, derived from five primary sources: 1) foundation grants; 2) private donations and contributions (individual and corporate); 3) special event ticket sales; 4) government grants; and 5) earned income from produce, prepared food, and merchandise sales.

We will rely on the strong support of thousands of volunteers

14. Describe the project's readiness for implementation.

Veggielution has over 12 years experience leading with innovative strategies to grow healthy, affordable food and connect local residents to the land and to each other. We have recently completed a land use planning process, through which we received specific input from community members to demonstrate more on-farm green infrastructure and sustainability practices. We also heard directly from East San José families who want to explore more farm-based economic enterprises. We have strong existing partnerships with the grassroots organizations that will help to support this work. Silicon Valley Bicycle Coalition has deep experience organizing and training volunteers, while working to increase ridership in all neighborhoods. After initial conversations with California Association of Family Farmers (CAFF) we feel equipped to create a food-safety plan and prepare for annual GAP audits. We currently work closely with Spade & Plow farm in San Martin, who currently lend us (and mentor us on use of) their packing line and cold storage for our farm boxes. We have also secured funding for an off-grid solar produce cooling unit to pack farm boxes onsite next year. Finally, we are well-positioned to explore a value-added product enterprise with our Eastside Grown program participants. We have already begun conversations with the Latino Business Coalition of Silicon Valley about creating a value-added product development module for the 2021 cohort training.

Personnel

Veggielution Special Events Manager (Eastside Connect program lead), Community Engagement Manager, Marketing & Impact Manager, Farm Manager, and Operations Coordinator will all be integral to the creation and execution of the bike delivery, food safety plan/GAP audit, and value-added product training development. Both SVBC and Veggielution volunteers will be participating in either bike delivery or implementation of GAP processes during farm box packing. We have recently reestablished our internship program with all paid positions, one of which will be assigned to the GAP certification process in 2021.

Contract Services

We will contract with Silicon Valley Bicycle Coalition to provide experienced team members who can help lead us through the design and successful implementation of a cyclist volunteer orientation and training program. They will run monthly orientations for new volunteers, as well as manage the logistics of volunteer scheduling and organization for the delivery itself. The Latino Business Coalition Silicon Valley will provide consulting services to Veggielution to develop a value-added (Veggielution farm produce) product business skills training component. Once the initial learning component is developed, we will seek future funding to incorporate it into our Eastside Grown food sovereignty training program.

Supplies and Materials

Project Goals (15 points)

18. Describe the specific problems, issues, or unserved needs the project will address.

The impact of the COVID-19 pandemic has forced us to think long and hard about our connections to food, where it is grown, and who is growing it. It has laid bare the reality that our local food system is unequal, unsustainable, unstable, and in dire need of transformation and innovation.

Industrial agriculture continues to take a toll on human health, our economy, and nature. There is an unserved need to explore ways to grow, process, and distribute food in Santa Clara Valley without causing irreparable damage to the environment. By piloting farm box delivery by bike, Eastside Connect will demonstrate innovative ways to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, encourage outdoor activity, and promote community collaboration in our local food system. The shared experience of local residents and volunteers working together for a common cause will result in shared understanding and empathy across differences.

A window of opportunity has opened amidst the crisis as public opinion has shifted to a renewed interest in local food production. There is an unserved need for urban agriculture to demonstrate how we can equip ourselves and our neighbors with the skills and tools needed to safely and effectively grow more of our own

food on a daily basis, and in preparation for times of crisis. By including volunteers at each step of the GAP certification learning process and packing line improvements, Eastside Connect will offer local residents the chance to learn and grow with us as we increase the safety, sustainability, and abundance of our urban farm.

The current pandemic has increased food insecurity and social isolation for many local families due to disrupted health and nutrition services, job and income losses, disruptions in local food supply chains, and as a direct result of COVID-19 infections. Our global chains of production are largely sustained by people of color literally putting themselves at risk to feed us. There is an unserved need to build sustainable local, even neighborhood-level, food systems that value lived experience and prioritize opportunities for historically impacted communities to lead and innovate. Eastside Connect will address the need by exploring new ways for urban agriculture to contribute to the economic mobility of low-income residents.

Located in the low-income community of East San José, Veggielution's Eastside Connect program focuses on the importance of public open space as a local source of some portion of our community's food. As our community slowly emerges from sheltering in place, the physicality of engaging with urban open spaces such as Veggielution and the surrounding parks, trails, and bike lanes, can help us address the need to rebalance from the virtual toward the real. Accessible to the public at no cost, spaces like Veggielution play a critical role in our community's recovery from the pandemic and resilience in the face of climate change.

Veggielution's Eastside Connect project will result in more community and climate resilience in East San José. The social goals of the project are:

To distribute fresh, locally-grown produce to 40 East San José families per week (6,200 boxes/year) in Year 1, To expand to 80 families per week (12,400 boxes/year) by the end of the 3-year project period.

To introduce at least 300 SVBC and Veggielution volunteers to the (agri)cultural gem that is Emma Prusch Farm Park, and to the surrounding East San José neighborhood

To support 10 East San José micro- food entrepreneurs in the successful development of a value-added (Veggielution farm produce based) product

To promote free, accessible public space where people from diverse backgrounds can meet each other

To provide recreational opportunities for volunteers and families through cycling and farm activities

To expand the network of local organizations working explicitly for more equitable and sustainable local food systems

To listen closely to the needs, concerns, and aspirations of historically impacted communities

The environmental goals of the project are:

To promote the environmental benefits of locally-grown fresh produce in East San José

To reduce and, eventually, eliminate the carbon emissions currently produced by utilizing a pickup truck to deliver Eastside Connect farm boxes

To complete a GAP-ready food safety plan for Veggielution

To train 10 volunteers and interns with food safety knowledge and skills

Impact (15 points)

21. Describe the lasting impact of the project.

Eastside Connect will further Veggielution's role as a culinary and community centerpiece that celebrates East San José by bringing diverse cultures and residents together to promote economic development, cross-cultural exchange and shared learning opportunities at Emma Prusch Farm Park.

The United Nations predicts that by 2030, two-thirds of the world's population will be living in cities. As populations continue to rise, urban agriculture will be an even more important strategy for growing food while also reducing the human impact on the environment. Eastside Connect will have a lasting impact as a model for urban agriculture in the Bay Area and nationwide. It will reinforce the growing public opinion that open spaces are essential for quality of life in urban settings. Over time, and with further demonstrated success, this program also has the potential to influence City and County policies related to zoning and other needs of urban production.

Through the sheer act of growing produce for our local neighbors, the project will have a lasting impact on urban open space by absorbing carbon emissions, deflecting solar radiation, and purifying storm water. The environmental justice implications of this impact cannot be overstated, as East San José is a neighborhood that has suffered the long-term environmental, social, and economic effects of redlining for decades.

Eastside Connect will shape public dialogue about our food system and environment. By connecting people to the land and their food, to each other, and to diverse cultures across the barriers that divide us. East San José residents as well as visitors and volunteers from many other areas will find a shared space for these conversations to lead to systemic change through intentional leadership development and community organizing.

Finally, in a neighborhood that is experiencing the advanced stages of gentrification and displacement, Eastside Connect presents an opportunity for us to support the economic ingenuity of East San José residents. It uplifts the needs, values, and aspirations - economically and socially - of East San José residents by focusing on urban agriculture as a platform for learning skills that are transferable to other sectors. It will increase access to opportunities in the post-COVID economic recovery and positively influence the narrative of East San José.

Veggielution's community engagement process promotes community-led advocacy and organizing efforts for policy and systems change. We work as part of the Si Se Puede Collective to:

Identify cross-organizational strategies and associated messaging, complete with shared analysis, criteria, trigger points, and a media plan to implement the neighborhood agenda. Conduct collective leadership development and base-building through political education and skill building related to environmental and food equity issues.

Develop a neighborhood-driven agenda and policy/advocacy platform to address a wide range of community opportunities and issues.

Eastside Connect addresses important issues such as food access and education and supports innovative ways to increase local food production in urban environments. It goes beyond the work of providing access to nutritious, fresh produce by fostering community engagement and building on Veggielution's deep commitment to collaboration and collective action. It is a more equitable model of a local supply chain because it places our most highly impacted community members at the center. Veggielution's location at Emma Prusch Farm Park allows is ideal for demonstrating emerging tools and technologies that increase pandemic and climate resilience in urban open spaces. Eastside Connect is also an innovative approach to producing and promoting local and ethnic specialty products, which define and celebrate the diversity of San José, and are key to a vibrant local food system.

By establishing a new partnership with the Silicon Valley Bicycle Coalition, we will demonstrate more innovative and environmentally sustainable methods of local food distribution. We are currently working in coalition with several other local organizations (including Fresh Approach, Pie Ranch, Spade & Plow, Edible Schoolyard) to participate in the USDA Farm Fresh Food Relief Program. Growing our onsite capacity to safely aggregate, pack, and distribute produce would allow us to grow our role in this coalition as well.

Over the past nearly 12 years since Veggielution was founded, we have gained extensive experience in planning and implementing youth education, community engagement, and food sovereignty programs in partnership with The City of San José Parks PRNS. Our diverse staff and board members have significant experience ranging from environmental education, community outreach, and farm management, to digital media marketing, food safety, economic development, and fundraising. Over the past five years, we have grown our organization's budget 250% and have expanded our individual and corporate donor as well as foundation base.

Veggielution's strong connection to the East San José community aligns with the City's goals to enhance economic activities and civic engagement in underserved and underutilized areas. Our location at Emma Prusch Farm Park allows us to reinforce the historical food-land connection of this special piece of Santa Clara Valley in a way that expands upon the notion of a farm as just a method of food access and production.

We have a history of successful past projects including our most recent 2020 Land Use Plan. We began Eastside Connect in March 2020 and in just over three months since its inception, we have already delivered 520 farm boxes and resource bags to local families. More than 30 low-income East San José food entrepreneurs have graduated from our Eastside Grown food sovereignty program. Many of them are currently working with us to deliver farm boxes each week and, beginning in July, deliver 300 hot meals per week to vulnerable East San José residents. We have a strong social media presence, through which we regularly share stories of the individuals, programs, and partnerships that contribute to and advance our mission.

Eastside Connect addresses open space needs in a Deep Engagement Community. East San Jose has a rich history of migrant farm workers and community organizers like Cesar Chavez, and to this day continues to attract waves of new immigrants – including Mexicans, Central Americans, and South East Asians – for the construction and service work that grew from the technology boom in Silicon Valley. Despite residents' commitment to hard work – most individuals work multiple jobs – the average median income is \$27,538 annually, roughly one-third of Santa Clara County's median income (\$106,761). Mayfair residents have a rate for diabetes deaths that is over twice the rate for Santa Clara County, and also have some of the worst incidence of heart disease and obesity in the area. In East San José, the death rate from COVID-19 is four times as high as in the wealthiest zip codes. Additionally, East San José has the highest pedestrian-bike collision rate in San José. Despite these challenging economic and health circumstances, East San José is a vibrant place, rich in cultural and culinary traditions. Veggielution's Eastside Connect program will harness the growing momentum among San José residents and community and City leaders to change the narrative of the Eastside by elevating its rich (agri)cultural history and the aspirations of its residents.

Veggielution was intentionally built upon a familiar platform with deep cultural and regional context - food and agriculture - in a free, publicly accessible space. Our unique location at Emma Prusch Farm Park allows us to reinforce the historical food-land connection of this special piece of Santa Clara Valley in a way that expands upon the notion of a farm as just a method of food production. As with other programs and efforts at Veggielution, we have designed this project to connect East San José residents, as well as visitors from throughout Santa Clara County, to the land, to their food, and to one another, while encouraging them to make change in their community. The project will provide an opportunity for residents from many different places to meet and learn from each other, while supporting skill development and confidence building in biking and urban agriculture. By having a strong group of engaged volunteers, we are also better prepared to respond and recover when emergencies strike.

Eastside Connect was created to promote community building through local food system development to increase civic engagement in San José. For the more than 12 years since Veggielution began, we have valued volunteerism is a key contributor to civic engagement and community well-being. Eastside Connect will further build community members' sense of social connectedness by encouraging a shared sense of purpose among people from different backgrounds and cultures.

Eastside Connect centers food as a vehicle for bringing together community members who might not otherwise know each other to meet, do something productive, and build community resilience to mitigate the effects of climate change. By focusing on climate-ready farming practices and increasing community

cohesion, we can better prepare for times ahead when we will need to support each other during an emergency. Shifting to bike delivery reduces emissions and raises the visibility of cycling as both a mode of transportation and food distribution. Getting volunteers out biking the streets of East San José will have the added effect of increasing ridership and encouraging advocacy for safer bike infrastructure. The very act of growing food on urban open spaces serves to increase vegetation cover is a key strategy for limiting rising temperatures. This project builds on the work that Veggielution has already done over the years to bring sustainable farming practices and emerging technologies to Emma Prusch Farm Park. Included among them are: cover cropping, crop rotation, drip irrigation, no till demonstration fields, aerated static compost, increased tree canopy, native plant hedgerows, and--most recently--the purchase of an off-grid solar produce cooling unit.
